

What priority calls does the HCSO have?

The HCSO has four priority of calls. Definitions and examples appear in the table below.

Priority	Definition	Examples
Priority 1	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Reports of serious injury having occurred or imminent and/or serious offense is in-progress• Crimes in progress and/or life threatening situations• In-progress assaults/robberies that involve bodily injury• Riots or other large disturbances involving serious bodily injury or threats of serious injury• Property crimes involving imminent danger to the complainant	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Panic alarms• In-progress call• Auto-pedestrian accident• Home invasion
Priority 2	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• In-progress or potential crimes in progress that do not involve weapons or threats of serious bodily injury• Burglaries, robberies, assaults requiring a report to be made by a deputy• All in-progress calls where life threatening conditions do not exist	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Stolen vehicle• Sexual assault• Drive-by shooting• Car-jacking• Aggravated robbery• Burglary of habitation• Family Disturbance
Priority 3	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Calls that receive an "as available" response• Use of emergency equipment is not authorized• Theft/burglary reports	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Welfare check• Road rage• Racing on highway• Shoplifter• Burglary of motor vehicle• Suspicious person
Priority 4	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Information-only	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Stranded motor vehicle• Abandoned vehicle• Submit evidence• Alert/Crime tips
